


2018. A sound piece, with Gareth Fry, for Somerset House show By the Deep, By the Mark, commissioned and led by Eloise Hawser.


2020: Began recording oral histories in The International Year of the Nurse & Midwife. We sent an invitation to everyone trained at the Nightingale Training school, and the next generation Nightingales.

Active invitation to nurses from groups who were historically underrepresented at St Thomas'.

The visual ID nods to the Nightingale badge and to countless nurses whose lives have not been illuminated in museums, including Kofoworola Abeni Pratt and Princess Ademola.

The good nurse, writes Florence Nightingale (1859), "must make no demand on the patient for acknowledgement or even perception of her services, since the best service a nurse can give is that the patient shall scarcely be aware of any."

Morisha Moodley, recorded for Moments of Grace (2021): "I think the presumed invisibility of nurses links to gender in that a lot of nurses are women. And historically have always been women. And women are expected to take the role of care giver, without ever saying anything about it, or acknowledging that they've taken that role. And then they're also made to not comment on maybe their difficulties, or even their achievements, as being a care giver."

Moments of Grace highlights the value & complexity of nurses' and midwives' time, in the relatable form of narrative.



Moments of Grace The Oral Archive

To date: 45 diverse nurses and midwives, aged 22-87, whose lives have intersected with world historical events, and deeply personal ones. 5000 minutes of recording.

"When you're musically improvising and you have this connection that you can't put into words but that's a response to and with somebody else, what you're creating is something that is more beautiful, more challenging, more expansive than either of you could on your own. The same moment can happen in nursing. I would describe it as a moment of grace." Ian Noonan, mental health nurse



Bench Alcove: Central Hall

We'll make 100 bite sized sound and light compositions, indexed to different times of day. One composition for every fifteen minutes of the day.

So, if you enter at 2am you might hear of sightings of the gray lady, at 4.27 you might hear about an emergency delivery, at 3pm you might hear of nurses hitching a ride with the river police...

We can program particular stories to appear at Eid, Saga Dawa, Christmas, Groundation Day and so on.



Installation ingredients:

- 1. Original music
- 2. Light
- 3. Nurses voices

The compositions will show nurses in so many different guises - as artists, friends, daughters, scientists, advocates, carers, policy makers, healers, listeners, diagnosers, researchers, and crisis managers.

Our 'Proof of concept' website won the London Community Story Award



The installation is silent until someone sits down (motion sensor).

Once seated the visitor experiences the intimacy of voices next to their ears. Some compositions are solo voiced, others feature several voices in conversation.

5 small speakers (5:1 surround sound) so we can spatialize different voices and instruments across the alcove to create an immersive experience.



The light dial can tell the objective time and express subjective dimensions of time.

The rays of light in the light dial can change direction, focus, speed to express the way time is experienced subjectively by the nurse storytellers and their patients. Time freezes, warps, and even disappears at the end of life.

Light is integral – a tonal, rhythmic element.



QUESTIONS FOR THE COMMITTEE

- 1. Occasional washes of coloured light from the lip of the alcove?
- 2. Interactive buttons?Back plays compositions indexed to the more distant past.Forward plays night-time compositions, or even The Future?
- 3. Can we install the bench alcove in the quietest part of Central Hall?



4. 2023 Audio production workshops, open to staff, geared towards creating compositions for the artwork will be run in early 2023. Your thoughts?

Nurses and young people can curate stories from the oral histories – living memories.

The stories of future nurses can also be captured in the form of radio diaries or of more creative pieces. For example:

A KCL nursing student shared a prophetic dream with me. It's 2040 and the world is flooded under 7 miles of water, but St Thomas' Hospital miraculously floats on top...What powers do future nurses have, she wonders?

Other are interested in making audio pieces about the lives of historic nurses. See overleaf.

"It's hard to find detailed information about Princess Adenrele Ademola. A few photos, the basic facts of birth (1916), royal parents in Southern Nigeria, migration to the UK, midwife and nurse training at Guy's Hospital, qualifying in 1941. There are records of her working in London hospitals during WW2 and the name her patients adopted for her – 'Fairy'. The colonial office made a film about her that circulated widely in West Africa as part of their efforts to recruit from the colonies as part of the war effort. The film, very sadly, has been lost.

So who was she? What made her tick? What were her experiences of nursing and living in this country?

She looks straight at the camera, a half smile revealing perfect, even teeth. Her wide face is framed by hanging earrings, a stylish high topped hat and a statement rope necklace. She leans a little to one side, her forearms resting on the top of the opened train window – if you are old enough you will remember those ones? - the top half of the compartment door, the window you pulled down with great effort and a crash and leaned out of to kiss your loved one goodbye? Or in romantic films where lovers held hands, one on board the train, the other walking along the platform until the speed of the train parted them. Steam trains that bore witness to immigration arrivals at Plymouth or Southampton docks, or fond farewells at city and village stations." Liesbeth de Block
